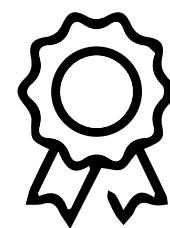

Council has honoured the Volunteer of the Year Award recipients for 2021 — announced during an online ceremony on Tuesday 12 October.

Recipients Anne Clare, Glenn Cooper, Andrew Maling, Hannah Swinnerton and local charity, Local 2 Community, were all acknowledged for their selfless commitment to the Frankston City community.

The online event was attended by Mayor Kris Bolam, Council CEO Phil Cantillon, the Federal Member for

Dunkley, Peta Murphy MP, and the State Member for Frankston, Paul Edbrooke MP.

Mayor Bolam said the awards are a wonderful way for Council and community members to acknowledge volunteer contributions.

“Our volunteers give so much of their time, their passion and their dedication to helping others and to making sure our community is the very best it can be. We would be lost without their hard work and selflessness,” the Mayor said.

“Council is fortunate enough to be home to 436 volunteers, who support the delivery of key Council programs, giving 55,808 hours of their own time and contributing \$1.4 million worth of value as in-kind support.”

Ms Murphy said: “We thank those terrific individuals and organisations who go above and beyond to support our community, in particular over the past 18 months.”

Mr Edbrooke said: “I am humbled to celebrate our local volunteer champions who have stepped up

when our community needs them. “Our community punches well above its weight when people need help and it’s our volunteers who are on the front line so it entirely appropriate that we acknowledge these modest community champions. Congratulations to all our Frankston winners, you thoroughly deserve this award,” Mr Edbrooke said.

Mayor's message

COVID update

It has been fantastic to see our community come alive upon our emergence from the most recent lockdown. At the time of publication, an incredible 92.3 per cent of Frankston City residents had their first jab, with 84 per cent double dosed. This has been an extraordinary effort between Council, Peninsula Health, other health stakeholders and both the state and federal government to encourage and educate regarding vaccination but most of all an incredible effort from our community to protect their neighbours and to help struggling businesses to reopen. Anyone who is yet to book their first jab can do so at the Community Vaccination Hub at Bayside Shopping Centre. The more people vaccinated, the more safe and resilient Frankston will be against future outbreaks of COVID.

Busy Council

As I have previously reported, Council has had an enormous year of decision making in 2021. The past six months alone have seen many important new projects and plans get off the ground and Council has resolved a number of important decisions. This includes:

- Councillors recently approved a planning application for an \$86 million residential estate for 135 homes to be developed on Pagett Road.
- A permit has been issued for the \$46.4 million Sandford housing estate on Brunnings Road, Carrum Downs. This development will include the construction of 162 new homes.
- The \$82 million nine storey residential apartment building, at 1-2 Plowman Place, Frankston is close to construction commencement.

- A new Domestic Animal Management Plan, which has overturned historic bans of dogs in our city centre and provided for a dog beach in Seaford. Council also increased the rebate for those that train their dogs through accredited obedience trainers from 10% to 50%.
- Council undertaking a comprehensive review of all industrial precincts throughout the municipality to investigate strengthening existing industrial sites and potentially unlock new industrial sites.
- A new Procurement Policy which adds a new 10% weighing for businesses that are local or possess social and sustainable practices.
- Waivers for sporting clubs and community centres to assist with the impacts from the recent lockdowns.
- New committees – such as the Foreshore Advisory Committee, Tourism Committee and Sport and Recreation Advisory Committee – and new networks – such as the Gender Equality Network, CALD Network and LGBTIQ+ Network – to ensure Council is sufficiently engaged.
- Extension of the outdoor dining parklets, designed to support local hospitality and alfresco dining businesses, to 30 June 2022.
- The transformation of the former St Kilda FC facility in Seaford to become a holistic hub for sport, health and wellbeing. Council provided in-principle support for this proposal in September and will make a final decision on the facility in December.
- New 'After Dark Activation Grants' to entice businesses to engage in festive activities to encourage the public to shop and frequent our city centres from dusk.



- Adoption of the Frankston City Reconciliation Action Plan (RAP), and the formation of a new advisory committee, to ensure collaboration with Indigenous residents and organisations. See page 5 for more information.
- Stage 2 of the \$67.6 million Chisholm Institute redevelopment has begun.
- The creation of the Frankston Business and Industry Chamber and the Frankston Job Seeker Alliance which will provide support and upskilling for both job creators and job seekers alike.
- The demolition of three structures at 8, 10 and 12 Davey Street was approved at the 15 November Council Meeting. Council is also assessing a \$90 million application to develop this land into two towers comprising apartments, commercial uses and a residential hotel.
- Council resolved to give formal in-principle support for the \$58 million Vicinity Balmoral Walk eight level office building development adjoining the Bayside Shopping Centre at the 15 November Council Meeting.

Message from the CEO

It's wonderful to see Metro Melbourne finally coming back to life since lockdown ended and we were particularly thrilled to be reopening Council's services and public spaces to our community once again.

I have also been incredibly proud of Council's response, not only to the pandemic but to a number of extreme weather events — even an earthquake — in the past few months. A big thank you to our dedicated Emergency Management and Relief and Recovery Teams who jumped into action to support the community following the recent wind storm in particular, with around 800 households affected in some way. The quickly established

Emergency Management Drop In Centre and swift response from our Customer Service Team and Recovery Call Centre should be praised and thank you to residents who also stepped up to support each other. I would also like to thank PARC and Pines Aquatic Centre for opening their doors to residents without power many days later and to community groups such as Community Support Frankston for their emergency relief efforts. Congratulations to all staff involved in delivering our first Frankston City Stakeholder Group. The online event, held in October, was attended by close to 50 participants, including representatives from a diverse range of community groups. Council presented



briefly on our Advocacy Priorities, Council Plan and Engage Frankston! platform. We were also lucky to have local resident, ABC reporter and author, Paul Kennedy as well as social welfare advocate and resident, Rev Tim Costello, present their thoughts and ideas on how our community can work together to achieve great outcomes. An example of excellent team work and enormous effort, which sets a high standard for similar future events.

Council launches Positive Ageing Action Plan 2021-2025

Frankston City is set to become a healthier and more liveable city for older residents, with the launch of Council's Positive Ageing Action Plan 2021-2025. Locals aged 60 years and older are Frankston City's fastest growing demographic, representing approximately 21 per cent of the municipality's total population or 28,012 people. This is expected to grow to 24 per cent of the local population by 2026.

The Plan will determine how Council will deliver its services, programs and infrastructure over the next four years, with a focus on promoting connection, supportiveness and engagement for locals 60 and older. The Plan will also inform Council's infrastructure and services priorities, to ensure older people feel safe and included, enjoy good

health and stay involved in their communities.

North East Ward Cr Suzette Tayler said: "Across the world, people are living longer, resulting in a change in the make-up of our communities. Ageing well is about more than just our genes or personal characteristics. Our physical and social environment has a huge impact on our quality of life."

Cr Tayler added: "That means Council and the community as a whole has a responsibility to ensure residents are able to continue participating in local community affairs and engaging in the kinds of activities that enhance physical and mental health throughout their lives." Reducing age-related barriers that stop older people from participating in community life

and prevent the wider community from enjoying the benefits of their contribution is also a focus of the Plan.

Council's *Positive Ageing Action Plan 2021-2025* includes, transportation, housing, social participation, outdoor spaces and buildings, community support and health services, communication and information, respect and social inclusion, civil participation and employment.

"Helping older people remain active and engaged is fundamental for happiness and fulfilment later in life that everyone has the right to expect," Cr Tayler said.

Frankston City honours our COVID-19 heroes

Council is honouring Frankston City's selfless heroes who did us proud during the COVID-19 pandemic. Mayor Kris Bolam said more than 60 organisations, which have supported our community throughout the pandemic, will receive COVID Hero scrolls to honour their contribution, including healthcare organisations, local charities, not-for-profits and more.

In addition to the scrolls, COVID Hero flags will fly in prominent locations across Frankston City including the Civic Centre, Frankston Arts Centre and Peninsula Aquatic Recreation Centre.

Mayor Bolam said: "The past 18 months is a period that none of us will ever forget – a global pandemic, restrictions, lockdowns and significant economic consequences.

But in Frankston City there's been a shining light – our compassionate and ever reliable COVID Heroes.

"Through it all our COVID Heroes have been like a beacon of hope and inspiration, providing vital support when our community needed it most. Our COVID heroes went 'above and beyond' in exceptionally difficult circumstances, giving Frankston City residents a remarkable example of the true meaning of community spirit," the Mayor said.

More CCTV to ensure safe and welcoming community

Council has invested in an extensive CCTV camera network of more than 200 cameras strategically situated across the Frankston municipality, with the vast majority providing a live feed to Frankston Police Station.

Mayor Bolam said: "There has been a significant increase in CCTV over the last two years with an estimated overall 20 per cent increase in cameras across Frankston City. Council's Community Safety Team works closely with local Police to identify sites for the new cameras, based on the location of incidents the police have had to attend.

"The CCTV program has assisted Victoria Police in responding to crime and

improved safety and security," Mayor Bolam said.

CCTV coverage includes Nepean Highway, Frankston, from Davey Street to Fletcher Road and the Seaford waterfront area. Council's CCTV program has been supported by State and Federal Government via grant programs.

Other recent safety initiatives include changes to the Community Local Law to ensure it is more community focused, and increasing patrols by Community Safety officers on the City's beaches over summer. For more information on community safety, visit: frankston.vic.gov.au/CommunitySafety

Working towards Reconciliation

Council adopted the updated Reconciliation Action Plan 2020-2022 at its 20 September Council Meeting.

Mayor Kris Bolam said: "Council is committed to working with our Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples and Traditional Custodians on our Reconciliation journey to build friendships, respect and opportunities.

"Through our Reconciliation Action Plan, we hope to work together with our communities to enhance the health, education and employment outcomes with our Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples, working towards closing the gap between Indigenous and non- Indigenous Australians," Mayor Bolam said.

"Frankston City benefits from the traditional culture of our Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people, which is resilient and characterised by strong recognition and valuing of the roles of Elders and traditional customs, such as a shared vision of community," the Mayor said.

The Plan provides Council with a formal statement of commitment to Reconciliation and supports the development of strategies and initiatives to enhance Council's ability to connect and engage with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders in Frankston City, building relationships, respect and trust and creating opportunities.

Councillors also voted to recognise the unique role of the Bunurong Land Council as the appointed Registered Aboriginal Party to be the representative corporation that is inclusive of all Traditional Owners in the Frankston City municipality, after working with representatives from multiple Indigenous organisations. Joy of the Earth's 'pickers and packers'



Community garden gives fresh gift during lockdown

Your local community gardens might not have been open to the public, but many have been supplying produce to soup kitchens and food banks, who provide for those doing it tough.

Local community garden, Joy of the Earth has been providing Peninsula Christian Care (PCC) with lots of leafy greens, fresh herbs, fruits and flowers since the first lockdown in March 2020, for their community food bank, Pantry Plus.

A group of local residents started Joy of the Earth after driving by four unused tennis courts on Joy Drive, Frankston almost 10 years ago. After applying to Council for a permit, the

garden was developed by volunteers, including Frankston Rotary and current Chairperson, Heather Whitfield. Together, they developed the space into 55 garden plots, as well as plots dedicated to supplying PCC. Lovingly maintained by 70 dedicated volunteers, the plot has grown to include beehives, a small orchard and lavish herb garden.

Since the pandemic shut the garden, a dedicated group of six pickers and packers obtained special permits to allow them to supply fresh food to those in need. The group have provided two boxes a week of assorted goodies for the past 18 months.

Sue Kerr, a founding member, says,

"I love the social side of the garden. I don't actually have a plot at the moment but I love coming to the working bees and the morning teas are lovely. It creates a sense of community connection for all our members."

"We have regular working bees where anyone can sign up on the spot and join in on the day, otherwise we are always open to new members, who all look after one or sometimes two plots." PCC Community Outreach Leader, Deborah Eastman said, "Having this fresh food to offer, in addition to other pantry staples, means we can also provide some healthy cooking tips and advice on how to best use the ingredients, especially the herbs.

"Joy of the Earth really goes the extra mile as well, making up these pretty herb posies of all different herbs that have gone to flower, which we can give to our guests as a gift. It's so lovely for them to know that others in the community are thinking of them," Deborah said.

Meet our Jobs Victoria Advocate: Paolo-Enrique Quintanilla

Jobs Victoria Advocate, Paolo-Enrique Quintanilla is originally from Chile. He immigrated to Australia with his family as a baby in the 1970s.

Paolo started his career in the retail sector. In 2008, he realised he wanted to pursue a career that allowed him to help others and he commenced a Diploma in Australian Sign Language. After graduating, Paolo commenced work with the Victorian Deaf Society (now known as Expressions Australia). For five years, he worked as an employment consultant, supporting deaf and hard of hearing people into employment and other vocational opportunities in Frankston. "Asking society to better support

people with disabilities is an advocacy role, and I spent a lot of time challenging unconscious biases around the capabilities of deaf people," Paolo said.

During this period, Paolo realised he wanted to move into the youth work space. He began working with headspace as a career advisor for young people, with the focus of his work on reinforcing positive self-esteem, empowerment and building resources to help young people to navigate their challenges.

This year, Paolo joined Council as a Jobs Victoria Advocate. It's his first role in government and he is relishing the opportunity to develop and contribute to a new program and team. During

pandemic lockdowns, a shift to online engagement has allowed Paolo to continue to provide support.

"I see change as a positive opportunity to grow. We are truly in a place of vulnerability when we need a job, or are considering a new career pathway. It can be a scary and hard time for people, but it is also when we grow the most. Our program is here to help make these transitions smoother and assist people with their own unique challenges and barriers" Paolo said. New international relations

Council has enjoyed wonderful Sister City relationships for many decades, with Wuxi, China since 2011 and with Susono, Japan for almost 40 years. The rewarding nature of these two relationships has prompted me to build additional relations with our neighbours in Suva, Fiji. Already, before any agreement was entered into, our two cities are already supporting one another, with Council and our community providing almost \$20,000 worth of urgent COVID aid to Suva and I am thrilled that we have since officially added Suva to our list of Sister Cities. This agreement was assisted with the support of the Victorian Multicultural Sports Association. We have also recently formed a Friendship City relationship with Tenby in Wales, the United Kingdom. The forming of this agreement was assisted by members of the Frankston-based Welsh Male Choir. Inevitably international borders will re-open and Frankston wants to position itself as a City that values both diversity and durable relations with our friends and sisters — close and afar.

Building Frankston's Future together

We have dedicated \$65 million towards our continuing program of infrastructure works. New projects completed, or nearing completion, include:

- We officially opened the \$9.147 million RF Miles Precinct Redevelopment.
- The sod turning for the planned \$35.3 million redevelopment at Jubilee Park, including the stadium revitalisation.
- The impressive \$4.2 million Centenary Park tennis centre revitalisation.
- A new turf wicket has been installed at AH Butler Oval in Frankston, ready for Frankston Peninsula Cricket Club to enjoy, at a total Council investment of \$115,000.
- The new cricket nets at Belvedere Reserve in Seaford are now ready for play, with \$270,000 invested by Council.
- The Belvedere Bowls Club extension is now complete, providing state-of-the-art facilities for the club to enjoy. The \$2.25 million project includes \$250,000 from the Federal Government and \$70,000 from the club itself.
- Council allocated \$666,000 to the recently completed Downs Estate precinct upgrade. This, included construction of a composting toilet, veranda works, a new path network, car parking, rainwater harvesting, solar panels and guttering.
- Completion of new public toilets at Peninsula Reserve and the Frankston Railway Station.

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Master Plan for Monterey Reserve, Frankston North

Monterey Reserve is an important place for community sport and recreation for people of all ages and abilities. Currently the reserve provides grassed open spaces, play equipment, a skate park, a sound shell, a dog free roam area and the Pines Soccer Club sporting facilities. An upgrade to the Soccer Pavilion is currently underway, including a new public toilet, along with a Master Plan for the Pines Aquatic Centre and a project has begun to redevelop the sports lighting. As part of our commitment to deliver a well-planned and liveable city, we are updating the Monterey Reserve Master Plan developed in 2004, with community consultation only just completed in early November. The update comes after the Frankston Draft Play Strategy Playspace assessment identified Monterey Reserve as a priority for District Level Play Space upgrades. Some of the potential improvements include: improved sporting opportunities and infrastructure, improved active recreation opportunities with improvements to the skate park and better use of the community stage and sound shell, reducing anti-social behaviour, better access for people of all abilities, providing more opportunities at the site for young people, especially girls, encouraging continued use by dogs and their owners, creation of better linkages across the site to schools, other parks, activity centres and the community hub and more.

Council supports new Golf Learning Hub

Council is supporting a new Golf Learning Hub planned for Sandhurst, run by the Professional Golfers Association (PGA). Council will contribute \$60,000 toward the project, subject to agreed deliverables and milestones demonstrating tangible progress of the project to Council's satisfaction. Frankston City has eight wonderful golf courses and the Hub will make Frankston a key destination for golf training and education programs. This will no doubt benefit, not only our resident golf enthusiasts but also attract more visitors to the area. The Hub will be accessible for golf industry training and education programs both domestically and internationally. The project involves the refurbishment of existing Sandhurst PGA building to ensure a fit for purpose facility for education and training. Working in partnership with Holmesglen Institute and with financial support from Council and the State Government, the initial intake of students will be welcomed in the first semester of 2022 and will have the flexibility to explore a range of subjects relating to a future career in golf.

Affordable housing as a solution to the homelessness crisis

Putting an end to homelessness in Frankston City has been a focus of Council's for many years. In 2019, Council helped to form the Frankston City Strategic Housing and Homelessness Alliance. Part of the Alliance's focus is also to leverage the partnerships of the Alliance to generate permanent solutions to the issue through increased affordable housing options.

The State Government's announcement in 2020 of a \$5.2 billion investment in social and affordable housing through the Big Housing Build, and its commitment to introduce a 10 Year Victorian Affordable Housing Strategy, and Local Government Compact have created a shift towards increasing the involvement of local government in the planning and delivery of social and affordable housing in local jurisdictions. Through this changed approach, Councils are encouraged to explore ways to work more closely with the State Government, along with Community Housing Organisations and developers to increase the supply of social and affordable housing in local jurisdictions. Cr Harvey, Cr Asker and myself sit on Council's Affordable Housing Subcommittee, which is working towards progressing this goal within our Local Government Area.

Housing is considered a basic human right, and as such is included in Frankston City Council's Community Building Outcomes Framework (CBOF) as the first outcome for the safe community policy domain. We are clear that Council's CBOF framework considers housing as essential public health infrastructure to support current and future populations. Affordable housing is defined as housing that is appropriate to the needs of very low, low, and moderate income households. It is understood that approximately 71% of households in Frankston fit within these income thresholds. We understand that Frankston is not alone in this, and that it has become harder over the past two decades for low income households to find affordable rentals right across South Eastern Metropolitan Melbourne due to rents rising faster than people's wages.

Council's Affordable Housing Sub-Committee are committed to investing time and energy into exploring the multiple opportunities available for Council to support an increase in affordable housing within the municipality, noting that these each require strong and healthy collaborative relationships with the Victorian Government; Community Housing Organisations and developers. This is an area Council will continue to explore, as one of many possible solutions to homelessness in Frankston City.

Outdoor Dining coming to Carrum Downs

In addition to new outdoor dining parklets along Nepean Highway, plans for outdoor dining in Carrum Downs are also underway. The new offering for local hospitality businesses will sit alongside other outdoor encouragement activations such as Council's Yoga in the Park Summer Series, launching in November. To date, Council has helped to deliver 19 additional outdoor dining spaces in Frankston City. The new additions in Carrum Downs will add to this impressive list and provide locals with the opportunity to enjoy the outdoor dining experience closer to home, as we all make the most of eased restrictions.

Vital support for sporting clubs

Sporting Clubs are experiencing very difficult times with unprecedented impacts on clubs financially, in membership and also with volunteers. Councillors voted unanimously at a recent Council Meeting to approve the waiving of \$149,337 worth of winter seasonal sports club tenancy and ground allocation fees for 33 sports clubs for the period 1 July 2021–30 September 2021. Council also waived school and personal trainer ground hire fees (\$9,500) and license fees and charges for licenced occupiers in Council-run community centres (\$26,100) for the same period. The waivers provide significant support following an incredibly difficult period of lockdowns. Sporting clubs are a vital part of our community and play an integral role keeping residents healthy and connected.

A district level playground for Carrum Downs

Carrum Downs Recreation Reserve, on the corner of Wedge Road and Frankston-Dandenong Road is one of the largest and most important open spaces in the Carrum Downs, Skye area. The reserve is incredibly popular with locals and Council has decided to earmark this area as a destination play space, to ensure families are provided the best possible facilities for the kids to play and learn. In 2021, Council was successful in securing a Victorian State Government grant through the Park Revitalisation Grants Programme for this project. A landscape concept plan was prepared to consider: the location of a new play space, how to plan for supporting infrastructure such as car parking, walking paths, and park amenity, planning for future projects including pavilion refurbishments and new multi-use courts. I urge residents to take a look at the Masterplan and have your say by 5pm, 27 November.

Major works begin on Hall Road

Hall Road, Carrum Downs is set for a safer, smoother ride with major infrastructure works commencing in November, to be funded by the Department of Infrastructure, Transport, Regional Development and Communications. The Hall Road upgrade works will deliver much needed road surface and pavement improvements to the area. Hall Road is a major road that moves a large amount of heavy traffic and we've been advocating hard to the State and Federal Governments to make this and other local roads safer for all users. Rehabilitation works include road surfacing along both carriage ways of Hall Road, between Frankston-Dandenong Road and Rowellyn Avenue and will considerably improve traffic flow and local access. I would like to thank the Federal Government for the \$4.25 million in funding that made this project possible. Works are scheduled for completion by March 2022. It was lovely to hear so many of you phoning in to tell your stories about growing up in the area, of the empty block of land which is now Carrum Downs Shopping Centre, visiting as a newly-arrived migrant, learning to drive in what is now the sewage farm in the 1960s, of hardly seeing any traffic. Such a wonderful initiative from the ABC and so incredible to hear these memories and to realise how much the area has changed over the years.

Station Street Mall shines with national award

Frankston's Station Street Mall, which began a \$2.27 million transformation in 2019, has won in the Civil Landscape category at the Australian Institute of Landscape Architects (AILA) National Awards 2021. The award underscores Council's dedication to the ongoing transformation of the Frankston City centre and creating the best outcomes for residents, visitors and business operators. I would like to acknowledge major contributions of \$360,000 (State Government) and \$100,000 (Vicinity Centres) to the project.

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Revitalising our city centre

You may already have enjoyed the new outdoor dining offering on Nepean Highway, completed just in time for reopening after our sixth lockdown. The new extended dining area caters for up to a total of 188 patrons outside 13 hospitality venues on both sides of Nepean Highway including Seagulls, Cosy and Tasty, Ha Long 2, Non Solo Vino, Olive and Fern and Iron River Bar and Grill.

Council's Invest Frankston Outdoor Dining and Activation Program 2.0 will add to existing parklets on Wells Street, Beach Street and Station Street in Seaford, while planning is underway for further parklets in other areas of Frankston City. Council is supplying all furniture and umbrellas for kerbside dining areas. The outdoor dining along Nepean Highway has been funded thanks to a \$200,000 grant from the State Government's Round 2 Outdoor Dining program and a \$135,000 grant from the Frankston Revitalisation Board, with \$25,000 contributed by Council.

Yacht Club update

The much anticipated internal fit out of new Frankston Yacht Club tenant, Oliver's Corner Café and Bar, is almost complete, with external works expected to wrap up in early 2022. Following the opening of Oliver's Corner, Council will commence an expression of interest process to attract a high end hospitality operator to occupy the first floor restaurant and function space. During this time, the community will also be invited to attend 'open for inspections' to get a sneak peek at the first floor space.

An architect has been engaged to undertake fit-out design on the first floor and it is anticipated the design will be completed and ready for construction in mid-2022. We expect this previously near empty building will be fully occupied and open to residents by the end of 2022. This is a significant win for the Frankston community, who have long requested this prime real estate be activated.

Relaunching events in Frankston City

As we celebrate re-opening, Council is in the process of securing new events and reinventing our existing events to reignite celebration across our city. From food focussed festivals to live music and outdoor cinemas, there will be so many reasons to stay and play and invite your friends and family to enjoy their time in Frankston City. 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New public toilets for Young Street

Rail users and those visiting central Frankston are now able to access new public toilets after construction was recently completed. The toilets near Frankston Train Station feature four unisex cubicles, including an accessible toilet, an ambulant toilet and a toilet for use by bus drivers. While highly visible on the corner of Young Street and Station Street, the amenity is softened in the urban landscape with a roof design that complements that of the station and distinctive paving that ties in seamlessly with the surrounding area. The works were developed with the Department of Transport and have been jointly funded by Council and the State Government's stimulus program. The new public toilet will be one that commuters, visitors and locals could use with confidence and comfort. Toilets are not necessarily something people rate in their reviews of an area — as opposed to its cafes and tourist sites — but they are definitely an amenity that can spoil or improve an experience. This new amenity for Frankston will improve the working day of our bus drivers, and help people to stay longer in our central retail district, which will provide broader benefits for the whole community.

Ratepayer rewards

We have had fantastic uptake of our Ratepayer Rewards program since its launch in July, as part of the \$3.86 million allocated to COVID recovery in the 2021-2022 budget. The \$1.1 million Ratepayer Rewards initiative enables ratepayers to take advantage of vouchers to enjoy local Council amenities and services. The program was designed to reinvigorate our local economy with the easing of restrictions and its popularity tells me that everyone is keen to get back out there and enjoy everything this city has to offer. The vouchers make it easier for you to enjoy a show at the Frankston Arts Centre, a dip in PARC pool or organise an at call hard waste collection service. Jubilee Park Stadium constructions begins

The \$35.32 million dollar Jubilee Park Stadium build is about to kick off, delivering an incredible sporting amenity to our community. Construction alone is expected to provide an approximate \$40 million boost to our local economy, while the finished product will help local netballers, basketballers, footballers and cricketers to better participate in community sport with state-of-the-art facilities. The new stadium includes six multipurpose indoor courts, including a 1000 seat show court, elite training facilities, female-friendly change rooms, a creche for players and spectators plus many other amazing features. The Stadium project has been made possible due to investment from Frankston City Council (\$20.56 million), the State Government (\$10 million), the Federal Government (\$4.56 million) and Cricket Victoria (\$200,000).

We have also heard your concerns regarding protecting native trees and vegetation and have ensured the project will also deliver ecological benefits and enhance the natural environment. A minimum of 100 canopy trees in two metre advanced height will be planted within the carpark and building precinct along with 700 indigenous trees across Jubilee Park. A vegetation management plan has been developed to improve the condition of the remnant indigenous vegetation. Council will also rehabilitate and enhance areas of existing remnant native vegetation largely in the northern portions of the reserve stadium construction works are scheduled to commence from mid November 2021 with completion by June 2023. Council exploring ways to bring forward net zero emissions target

Council is investigating ways to accelerate the organisation's net zero emissions target, for Council's 2023-24 operational budget.

The current target commits Council to achieving net zero emissions by 2024-2025.

To achieve 'net zero emissions' Council must reduce its greenhouse gas emissions as much as it can through energy efficiency and renewable energy initiatives, and then offset any remaining emissions by investing in carbon offset projects.

South Ward Cr Claire Harvey is Council's representative on the South East Councils Climate Change Alliance (SECCCA), who is calling on both the Federal and State Governments to support their communities to take

urgent action and protect them from the impacts of climate change.

Cr Harvey said that Council is being called on by Frankston City residents to lead by example on climate action. "Local Government and taxpayers all share the burden of climate change - increasing natural disasters like bushfires and heatwaves will cost us financially, above and beyond the very obvious impacts to our environment and to our health and wellbeing."

Environmental Sustainability Grants program now open

Council's 'green light' for environmentally friendly upgrades

A Frankston City Council Environmental Upgrade Finance (EUF) loan, facilitated through Better Building Finance, will enable businesses to upgrade to environmentally friendly equipment, whether it be installing solar panels, electric vehicle charging stations, water efficiency initiatives, replacing lighting or other improvements.

Council's involvement means businesses can upgrade buildings sooner all while accessing affordable finance terms and savings along the

way. Frankston Council joins more than 40 existing council partners in Victoria after the program received support from the Australian Renewable Energy Agency (ARENA). To date, Better Building Finance has worked with local councils to facilitate more than 100 environmental upgrade projects at an investment of more than \$40 million, generating almost 10,000kW of solar power, which will reduce carbon emissions by around 500k tonnes over the life of the projects. Your business may be eligible to receive large discounts on energy upgrades thanks to a joint initiative between Council and South East Councils Climate Change Alliance (SECCCA).

Through the Small Business Energy Saver Program, businesses in a range of industries including hospitality and retail, arts and recreation, accommodation,

manufacturing and warehousing, sporting clubs and facilities and professional services (i.e. allied health) can receive a discount on the upfront cost or rebate to upgrade equipment (up to \$2,000 per business) and subsequently save on energy bills.

Imaginative play will be prompted by fun sculpted chickens, nests and eggs that link back to the history of the site. A path and open area will provide a space for scooters, small bikes and skaters. Across the city, Council is working to improve recreational open spaces with more path connections and tree plantings, shaded picnic areas with a focus on improved biodiversity and habitat. Councillors voted to adopt the grant guidelines and commit funding of \$120,000 at the 20 September Council Meeting.

"The Invest Frankston After Dark Activation Grant is a new grant program aimed to support Frankston City's transformation into a vibrant, diverse, inclusive and safe destination after dark," Deputy Mayor Nathan Conroy said.

Cr Conroy noted: "A thriving and dynamic night-time offering comprises a range of experiences including dining, performances, live music, events, shopping, nightclubs,

twilight markets, sporting events and delivered by a range of diverse businesses and community groups. In turn, this attracts visitors and entrepreneurs, creates jobs and drives economic development.

"With a funding pool of \$120,000, matched-fund grants of up-to \$30,000 will be available to financially assist local businesses, creative agencies, community groups and entrepreneurs build a vibrant night time economy by developing new and interesting experiences and destinations that encourage 'a good night out' in Frankston's City centre," Cr Conroy said.

Cr Conroy said the anticipated outcomes of the grant program include greater diversity of business offerings at night, a safer, more

vibrant and engaging City centre after dark, a greater range of cultural activity offered in unexpected ways in new venues and spaces, and an increased quantity and quality of live music and performance venues and programming.

Cr Conroy said Council is dedicated to proactively assisting Frankston City businesses emerge from the COVID-19 pandemic, adding: "Enhancing Frankston City's night-time economy through the establishment of a night-time activation grant will make an important contribution to the City in terms of economy, image, reputation, and in improving the experience of residents and visitors.

Applications for Invest Frankston After Dark Activation Grants are scheduled to open in July 2022.

Cr Conroy said Frankston City Council's Invest Frankston campaign is attracting business and investment to the municipality, adding: "The campaign is reaping rewards, with Council currently facilitating over 100 business and investment enquiries through both the Business Concierge and Investment Attraction specialist services."

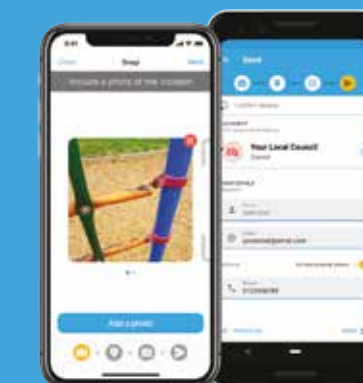

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Council supports our Fijian neighbours with urgent aid

Council is extending a helping hand to Fiji to provide critical humanitarian assistance, particularly with the challenges of the COVID-19 pandemic.

Mayor Kris Bolam, who initiated the assistance, was approached by the Victorian Multicultural Sports Association Inc seeking a contribution from Council for humanitarian support, noting the Frankston and Suva (Fiji) are now officially Sister Cities.

Mayor Bolam reached out to business and community contacts, raising \$8400 within two weeks on top of a \$6000 contribution from Council.

The Mayor added: "There's been significant corporate stewardship with community organisations and individuals providing support. It's been a marvellous effort with many providing items and businesses providing discounts for the purchase

of essential aid for what is an important cause."

Victorian Multicultural Sports Association Inc President Victor Kumar said the assistance will provide a boost, adding: "This vital support will make a huge difference in Fiji, particularly to mothers and babies. It means a lot to the people of Fiji during these difficult times."

Donations include sanitary products for women and baby products for newborns, together with donations of children's clothing, sanitiser and personal protection equipment. Council has also provided \$5500 for the delivery of hospital beds as part of the assistance to Fiji to assist with their response to the COVID-19 pandemic. Council adopts Play Strategy and Local Park Plan

Frankston City's Play Strategy and Local Park Plan have been adopted by Council following extensive community consultation.

North West Ward Cr Steven Hughes said: "The Play Strategy provides a framework to assist Council with the prioritising and delivery of play improvements for the community for the next 15 to 20 years."

"It aims to connect communities better through play; provide better integrated, inclusive and accessible play spaces; provide more diverse and better distributed play spaces; introduce new types of play; and improve the design, delivery and maintenance of play spaces across Frankston City."

"The Local Park Plan provides a framework to assist Council with prioritising and delivering open space improvements for local-level parks that do not contain play spaces."

"The Plan focuses on local parks in Carrum Downs, Frankston North and Langwarrin as high priority neighbourhoods, primarily due to local population densities, growth and demand. Local-level parks in remaining suburbs will be reviewed in 2022," Cr Hughes said.

The Play Strategy prioritises safe and well maintained play spaces, inclusive and accessible experiences, diverse play, sustainable facilities, valued open space, and flexible community infrastructure and community awareness.

Councils come together for our environment

Frankston City Mayor Kris Bolam and City of Kingston Mayor Steve Staikos have joined forces to advocate for recycled water projects and spread the message about the need for more efficient and sustainable use of our most precious resource — water.

Mayor Bolam said: "By using recycled water, Council is reducing demand on Victoria's drinking water supplies and contributing to the sustainable use of water. With average rainfall expected to decrease across Victoria as a result of climate change, saving water is essential to building community resilience."

When recycled water is used for irrigating sports reserves, it helps to drought-proof the site, particularly during times of water shortages as recycled water is not subject to water restrictions. This ensures ongoing access to an important asset for community health and wellbeing.

Mayor Staikos said our valuable drinking water supplies are becoming increasingly scarce, and expensive so it is imperative we find new and sustainable ways of sourcing water for our local food producers, garden industry and parklands.

"More efficient water use and alternative water sources are needed

to ensure the long-term sustainability of the local food production industry, not only in Kingston but also in the entire South East region.

"Council's target to increase the use of alternative, sustainable water sources to 60 per cent by 2026 relies on the Victorian Government investing in recycled water infrastructure. Council has been working in partnership with South East Water to explore the possibility of connecting recycled water to additional highly valued community-use sites throughout Frankston City," Mayor Bolam said. Lockdown ends with a revitalised clubroom for Belvedere Bowls

The \$1.6 million Belvedere Bowls Club revitalisation is now complete. Club members are thrilled with the new facility, which will finally get a work out as restrictions ease.

Improvements include:

- Demolition of an existing single storey office building on the site
- Extension of the existing single storey clubroom building including new change room amenities, match committee room, entry foyer, office, storeroom and cleaner's room
- Refurbishment of the existing social room, kitchen and pantry
- Alterations to the existing car park

Belvedere Bowls Club was created following the amalgamation in 2016 of Frankston RSL and Seaford Bowls

Clubs. It became evident the facility at East Rd, formerly Seaford Bowls Club, was no longer functional or fit for purpose following the merger.

Former President Rod Atherton, who was responsible to the Board to work with Council on the project, said, "There was an obvious need to upgrade the toilet and the disability facilities, improve energy efficiency with facilities like solar panels and water tanks as well and increasing the size of the clubrooms.

"This work has exceeded expectations and there has been very positive feedback from members and guests and we are already experiencing an increase of interest from the local community about joining the club," Rod said. An official opening was held Tuesday 16 November.



Council and St Kilda Football Club kick goals for a healthier future

Plans for a community Healthy Futures Hub at Seaford have taken a step forward.

Developed in partnership with the St Kilda Football Club, the Hub will be a dedicated spot for local sport, health and wellbeing, with specific benefits for vulnerable groups in Frankston City. Councillors voted to support in principle the leasing, under new terms, of the Linen House facility at Belvedere Reserve, Seaford, to St Kilda Football Club for the development and use of a community health and wellbeing hub. Mayor Kris Bolam said St Kilda propose to run the facility as a Healthy Futures Hub with sub tenant partners.

"I want to thank St Kilda for the good faith they have demonstrated during this process. St Kilda are to be commended for their approach. It's

now over to the public to provide their feedback and I am looking forward to receiving that input."

Other partners also intended to operate as sub tenants, include leading disability service providers Wallara, Everyday Independence and Pathways to Care in addition to Chelsea Longbeach Physiotherapy.

Arrangements are also being finalised with some other community football organisations along with industry leaders in education, research and community health.
